Summer Adult Book Study

This past spring, adult education participants finished studying a curriculum called *Saving Jesus*, which intended to place the teachings, actions, and life of Jesus of Nazareth in its historical context on its own terms, before centuries of church doctrine developed *about* Jesus and the Christian faith. Between the two sessions each week, the regular attendance numbers went into the double digits.

Neither the New Testament nor the early church's understandings stopped with Jesus, as we well know. To really understand the faith of first-century Christians, another figure has loomed large: the apostle Paul.

Like Jesus, many of Paul's teachings have been taken out of context and misused by the Christian church throughout the centuries, and like Jesus, Paul also remains worthy of re-examination with an eye to his own historical context. And so, it only makes sense after the "Saving Jesus" program that we should now also "save Paul."

This summer, we will be continuing this adult
Christian educational thrust with a book study
on The First Paul by Marcus Borg and John
Dominic Crossan. We will meet once a week, in
person. However, we want to hear from you
about when! Please let Pastor Chris know if
you're interested in this study, and which
weekday and time (Monday-Thursday) works
best. And then, stay tuned to hear when we
schedule the first session—we'll be announcing
in the bulletin and online!

NCC Passes Resolution on Gun Violence, Mass Shootings, Commits to Do More

In response to the incessant gun violence and mass shootings rocking our nation, the Governing Board of the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA (NCC), at its annual Spring Meeting, passed a hard-hitting resolution on the issue, committing to increase its efforts to end the devastation and calling on its member congregations to do the same.

"As faith leaders in America, it is incumbent on us to address the escalating plague of gun violence in our nation," starts the resolution. "Since the beginning of 2023 alone, mass shootings from coast to coast have resulted in the devastating loss of hundreds of lives. Appallingly, it feels as if no one and nowhere is safe – not our schools, colleges and universities, medical facilities, grocery stores, movie theaters, social halls, financial institutions, shopping malls, homes, churches, or other houses of worship...It is necessary and reasonable to act quickly and decisively because we do not have to live like this," states the resolution.

Further, the resolution calls for congregations to use all their available resources to end the scourge of gun violence, to work across political lines and with faith and secular partners to find solutions to end gun violence and mass shootings, and to create safe spaces for those

inundated with violence and provide care for victims/survivors.

The resolution also calls for NCC member communions and congregations to "be attentive and offer a public witness and care to those in our communities who are susceptible to being perpetrators of gun violence, showing them grace and mercy, and attempting to put them in contact with resources that may help them choose a different path."

In addition, the resolution calls on the President and Congress to quickly introduce and pass legislation that would end "the massacres from weapons of war in our communities," and to hold public officials accountable for the lackluster and negligent legislative responses that occur after mass shootings. NCC has repeated calls for comprehensive gun violence reform and the banning of military-grade weapons in our communities

I want to thank Tom Rusch for his faithful accompaniment of hymns and weekly selections of keyboard music.


Stories from a Recent Choir Anthem

(extracted from "History of Hymns: 'Order My Steps'" BY M. ROGER HOLLAND II)

"ORDER MY STEPS"
by Glenn Edward Burleigh
Order my steps in your word, dear Lord.
Lead me, guide me, every day,
Send your anointing, Father, I pray.
Order my steps in your word.
Please, order my steps in your word.*

"Order My Steps" is one of the most well-known gospel songs written in the late twentieth century. Its



popularity transcends the Black church experience and has found popularity with numerous grade school, community, and college choirs. The song was written in 1991 by African American composer Glenn Edward Burleigh (1949–2007), an Oklahoma native.

Burleigh draws directly on Psalm 119:133, Psalm 19:14, Ephesians 4:29, and portions of the Charles Wesley hymn, "A Charge to Keep I Have."

The song was conceived while Burleigh viewed the St. Agnus Drill team (a variation of a step team) while visiting that church to preach. These teams are common on campuses of Historically Black Colleges and Universities. The activity of "stepping" is a combination of movement and rhythmic sounds created on the body and executed with precision that is an outgrowth of music created by enslaved Africans in the United States in the antebellum South who were forbidden to play drums.

Many contemporary church step teams employ scripture during their presentation to place the activity in a sacred framework. He was so inspired by the youth's performance that day, that he wrote the entire song that day.
