



From the Pastor's Desk

"'Woe to you, [religious leaders], hypocrites! For you tithe mint, dill, and cummin, and have neglected the weightier matters of the law: justice and mercy and faith,'" challenges Jesus in a long section of criticisms against

the religious authorities of his day (Matthew 23:23). It's always important to understand that Jesus was not condemning a religion but was really pointing back to the heart of serving as God's people. Jesus stood in the tradition of a long line of prophets who spent their lives trying to lead their people into understanding better that God's message was not about merely maintaining traditional religious practices.

Time and time again, the Hebrew prophets of our Old Testament—and then Jesus and the apostle Paul—challenge their society for focusing on a false religiosity that remains silent about the suffering of people or creation. As biblical scholar Marcus Borg summarizes the work of the prophets, their messages were usually that there is no true worship without justice. Or, put in another way, worship that is not concerned with justice is not legitimate worship of the God we find in the Bible.

The way we think of our faith today may still be challenged by this critique. It means that a discipleship rooted in caring for others carries a higher priority than any of our rituals. It means that working for justice lives at the center of our faith, not something we tack on as something extra

if we think about it when we leave church. It also means—again, as the prophets and Jesus like to remind us—that neglecting justice (especially in favor of preserving "spiritual" practices) means we have failed to worship or follow God faithfully.

And this justice, of course, is not criminal justice.

When the Bible speaks about justice, it is certainly social and economic justice. The prophets constantly criticize unjust economic assumptions and practices. And both Testaments are adamant about welcoming the stranger—whether foreigner, neighbor, enemy, or ritually "unclean." In fact—and scripture repeats this lesson many times—it is exclusion of others from holy places that leads to so-called "desecration."

As people always called to a discipleship that fearlessly follows Jesus, may we continuously remember the weightier matters of the law: justice and mercy and faith. Our call to offering an *unqualified* welcome to those excluded elsewhere is paramount to our faith lives and remains a much "weightier matter of the law" than keeping up cultural understandings of who and what is sacred and who and what is not. That's what *radical hospitality* looks like. We don't exist as a Body of Christ to serve ourselves, but to serve others.


Tech Opportunities

As many of you know in December, 2020, a monetary gift of \$502,000 was given to First Congregational UCC, Watertown. The anonymous donor specified no restrictions on their generous gift. The Church Council placed this gift in the United Church of Christ Cornerstone Funds. It was named the Rainmaker Fund, with the intent to set-up a committee to manage this fund at a later date. In early November of 2023 the newly formed Rainmaker Fund committee met. This committee consists of Jim Ortega, Chair, Sue Harms, Vice-Chair and Laurel Bentz, Secretary. Pastor Chris and Tom Rusch, Moderator will serve as Ex-Officio members. In our kick-off meeting, we discussed the purpose of our committee, our role, and our relationship to Church Council and our Church membership. Because it was determined that our role was to manage the Rainmaker Fund, it was important to discuss our philosophy and how this fund would function in our church. Thus, our work began for the next few months.

In our initial discussions, we all wanted the fund to be all encompassing, not just for ordinary expenses. As we reviewed other church documents, a line struck a chord with all of us - "These funds are more than holding onto money. They are about holding onto a mission...these funds will reach beyond our own lifetimes to support our congregation as a local church with a global ministry." We wanted this fund to be used for mission and other opportunities that might present themselves in the future. We wanted the Rainmaker Fund to empower our Church community to make a difference in our lives and perhaps impact the lives of the Watertown community.

As we continued our work, the committee agreed that the Rainmaker Fund was intended for the *future* of our church's mission. We wanted it to last well beyond our lifetimes. We determined with Church Council's advice that only the interest would be used annually for designated church projects. We also spent time discussing what elements we would take into consideration in evaluating appropriate projects. First and foremost, the project must align with First Congregational UCC's mission of our church now and into the future.

We have finalized our charter for the Rainmaker Fund and it has been approved by Church Council. We still have some final details to work through but will be ready soon to begin evaluating church project applications.

We cannot end this letter without a huge thank you and a recognition to the individual who gave our church this very generous gift! We believe the donor concurs with how their gift will be managed by our church. We are excited about the future ministries the Rainmaker Fund will help provide First Congregational, UCC, Watertown.

With grateful hearts for all God's gifts to First Congregational UCC, Watertown's mission of our church now and into the future.
