From the Pastor's Desk
It's no secret that the end of
this month of July brings an
event that has been on
many of our minds
(especially the minds of the
congregation's leadership)-Watertown's Pride event,
run by the Unity Project of
Watertown, but hosted this

year at our very own First Congregational United Church of Christ. Coincidentally, this month signals the 10th anniversary of our congregation's decision to commit to the Open & Affirming message.

It's also no secret that Christians in general have quite the track record at using scripture to attack LGBTQ+ folks. Unfortunately, when verses from the Bible get used this way, they are often taken out of context and used wrongly.

So, to help us celebrate our congregation's 10th anniversary of calling ourselves Open & Affirming and to help prepare ourselves to host the Unity Project's event, we will be exploring a few important scripture passages in worship that can help inform us better about what the Bible actually says. This sermon series starts on Sunday, June 30 and will continue until the Sunday before the Watertown Pride event. We begin on June 30 to capture the end of Pride Month and to honor the UCC's "Open and Affirming" Sunday. Every year, that Sunday marks the Sunday closest to the anniversary of the Stonewall Uprising in 1969 that sparked the modern gay liberation movement. (That anniversary also serves as the basis for June as Pride Month.)

For four weeks we will hear about the relationship between lovers David (yes, the one who became King) and Jonathan, how the rainbow represents God's covenant with the diversity of all creation, how the story in the Book of Acts of the Ethiopian eunuch shows the early church's welcome of folks of all kinds of sexual identities, and finally what the real sin of Sodom and Gomorrah was (and the surprising reveal of who keeps repeating it). Along the way, we will surely be reminded of the UCC's own history of being the first Christian denomination in the U.S. to ordain an openly gay man (in 1972) and an openly lesbian woman (in 1978). We will remember the United Church of Christ's official denominational commitment to being Open & Affirming that began in 1985.

My hope is that through recovery of some key scriptural passages from too many years of distortion by those who pretend to speak for all Christians, we can come to a renewed sense of what offering Radical Hospitality looks like.

# Report From The Wisconsin Conference Annual Meeting

#### **Observations From Green Lake**



The 62nd Annual Meeting of the Wisconsin Conference UCC was recently held June 7-9 at the Green Lake Conference Center. Every year I've attended this gathering I'm so inspired by the joyful music, learning more about the state of

our great Conference from our Conference Minister, Rev. Franz Rigert, listening to the inspirational messages from the keynote speaker and others, and gaining knowledge from the numerous workshop topics one can chose to attend.

- I have frequently wished during my attendance at this and past annual meetings, that every member of our congregation were in attendance, as they would be so proud to be a member of the United Church of Christ, *Where God is still speaking*.
- Individual articles could probably be written on multiple topics and facets of the meeting, but I have chosen to briefly highlight a few of the interesting points you may be hearing more about from the church.
- Part of Franz's Message During these days and time we must proudly emphasize our message "all are welcome here". "Using Jesus as our model, we are called to be truth tellers who practice civil discourse otherwise known as Christian behavior in order to show the world that it is possible to keep our integrity to treat those with whom we disagree lovingly."
- Association Changes We have not only seen individual UCC churches adjusting and settling into a new paradigm since the pandemic, but also many Conferences. Associations were established over six decades ago when the UCC was much larger. Recently, the Board of Directors has decided the Wisconsin Conference will move away from the associational structure. This upcoming structural change will not impact Conference staff, as our Associate Conference Ministers will remain

and continue to play a vital role in the support of individual churches.

- New Websites The Wisconsin Conference and the Damascus Project will both introduce newly redesigned websites this fall. The Damascus Project is a partnership initiative between the Wisconsin and Minnesota Conferences to provide growth in faith and leadership for clergy and lay leaders.
- How do we Connect Better This question is heard frequently by church lay leaders and pastors.
   Spiritual Connections. Engaging Relationships.
   Resourcing One Another. Connecting through pockets of ministry passion that will equip and inspire others to engage in such ministries. One such inspiration may come from the ten justice working groups within the Conference, providing a partial glimpse and opportunity for broader spiritual connecting relationships.
- Dire Need Not surprisingly, we are facing a critical shortage of pastors. It has been stated that responsibility for raising up new pastors falls on all of us. You know how most people discern a call to authorized ministry? Not by a lightening bolt or a billboard. Not by hearing the voice of God. But by someone who loves them, sees gifts in them and taps them on the shoulder saying, "Have you ever thought about pastoral ministry?"
- Leadership Forward Campaign Is a vital and important initiative through the Damascus Project to raise two million dollars for the primary purpose of equipping and training clergy and lay leaders with the skills to support and lead our local congregations in creative and meaningful ways to live out the values of Jesus.
- Finding Wisdom in Discomfort Keynote speaker Shari Prestemon, Acting Associate General Minister and Co-Executive Chair of Global Ministries for the United Church of Christ primarily focused her message on two points.

First, we need to pay attention to things that make us uncomfortable. Lets harvest that discomfort for the wisdom it holds. Maybe it's somehow changing how we've always done things in our church structure, or the unwelcome realization that fewer financial resources may require uncomfortable

evaluation of church building expenses vs ministry programs.

Rev. Prestemon stated the second object of our attention should be "the ways we're called to be present for one another. One of the gifts of the pandemic period, in my view, was how it caused us to realize that we really do need each other."

• Resolution of Witness - During Business Meeting 1 we heard reports on multiple topics such as Andrew Warner's presentation on the Conference's financial status and John Helt's Creation Care update, but the discussion and topic of a resolution of witness created possibly the greatest interest and attention. The Wisconsin Conference Board of Directors chose to present or bring forth a resolution of witness to the Annual Meeting to adopt the 2021 General Synod Resolution Declaration for a Just Peace Between Palestine and Israel.

The process for adopting a resolution of witness requires an affirmative vote at the 2024 Annual Meeting, followed by one year of study and engagement by local congregations. The resolution process calls for 30% of all Conference congregations to report that they have engaged in some study. This study can be in the manner chosen by the local church. This local study calls only for some discussion; it does not require that any action be taken or decision voted on. Congregations must formally inform the Conference that a study has been conducted by the congregation by May 1, 2025. If 30% of all congregations within the Conference respond, a vote to formally adopt the resolution will be held at the Annual Meeting in June 2025. I would urge our Church Council to seriously consider offering such a study for our congregation.

Social Justice Learning Sessions Continue Sunday, July 21st

On Tuesday evening June 4th, Pastor Chris Ross,
Pastor Carina Schiltz, and several members of
Watertown's First Congregational and Immanuel
Lutheran churches met in Fellowship Hall to learn
about LGBTQIA terms and myths. We were joined
by Pastor Jim Langreder of the Dousman and
Hartland UCC churches and Darcy Sobczak, the
leader of Peace House at Hartland's First
Congregational Church, who shared their
experience helping LGBTQIA youth.

The session was designed to encourage attendees to work together. First, attendees collaborated to complete an LGBTQIA term matching exercise. Next, we addressed five common myths about LGBTQIA people. Using a scenario, attendees discussed and learned how to respond when someone spreads fallacies.

Pastor Jim and Darcy shared their church's approach to helping LGBTQIA youth in Hartland. They discussed their safe space and the events they have hosted; such as a pot luck, PRIDE prom, Brewer's game trip, and youth group activities.
