From the Pastor's Desk



As we gird up for Advent and Christmas yet again, no doubt somewhere along the line—maybe in church, maybe in a random line of a Christmas carol—we'll come across the theological concept central to this story: *incarnation*. A basic surface-level description

of Christian incarnation explains that it's the idea that God became a flesh-and-blood human being in history known as Jesus. It's a notion grounded in ancient understandings of the divine, but it's one of those touchstones with a meaning that remains true.

Unfortunately, the incarnation often gets limited to how the earthly Jesus ended up; in cultural Christianity, God comes to us in Jesus to die for our sins. If we're able to put aside this dismissal of everything Jesus did and taught, we can see how the incarnation opens up to mean so much more.

The incarnation reminds us that God can indeed dwell in human flesh. One way to understand the incarnation is that it is God's *showing up* for humanity—more particularly for those considered “lowly” and the hungry (as Mary herself sings in Luke 1), for the shepherds (on the economic margins), for the refugees and immigrants (a nativity scene without refugees would be

completely devoid of people), for those for whom there is no room at the inn.

Here's the other thing about incarnation: the Christmas story is not the only time the New Testament relies upon incarnational imagery. When the apostle Paul writes in his letters of the Body of Christ—specifically with each of us as the members—that's also incarnational language. And it means much the same thing: *we are also called to show up for humanity*. We are also called to show up for the lowly and the hungry and those on the economic margins and the refugees and the immigrants and all those otherwise excluded. *In fact, that's the whole point of incarnation!*

As we again hear the cultural clashes of an imaginary “war on Christmas,” let us remember that to keep Christ in Christmas is really to embody the incarnation in the Body of Christ today.

The gatherings will be very basic, so hardly any knowledge of the geography or history of the area is necessary.

You may remember reading back in October that, before my week of vacation during Halloween, I was scheduled to do some "continuing education." Did you wonder what I was doing?

I recently joined a program of the Wisconsin Conference that's part of an international church partnership with the Pennsylvania Central Conference (that's not the international part...) and the Evangelical Church in the Rhineland, part of the church in Germany that served as the root of the E & R (Evangelical and Reformed) side of the UCC. After Easter, I will have the opportunity to visit our counterparts in Germany. But for that week in October, the German delegation was visiting the U.S., and we met at Daycholah Center.

It was an intense week. The focus of this group is to study White Christian Nationalism in both the U.S. and German contexts. Each day included group devotions, but diving into the hard stuff made up most of our work. We looked at the differences in political systems between Germany and the U.S., including the role of the church in both countries. We discussed the basic tenets of White Christian Nationalism. We heard from a former member of a hate group. We visited the Black Holocaust Museum in Milwaukee.

All of our sessions directed us toward creating an action plan and covenant as a response to White Christian Nationalism in each of our settings. So, as a result of our often long conversations, we developed a draft of what we've been calling the "Daycholah Declaration." Here it is:

Daycholah Declaration

We observe that the church is in crisis.

We are dismayed to see the gross perversion of the Gospel of Jesus Christ by using a narrative of fear, manipulation, scarcity, violence, domination and hate as a political means to perpetuate the heresy of White Christian Nationalism.

We confess we have not offered sufficient opportunity to offer a perspective of hope as an alternative to fear.

We confess that this has often led us into exclusive safe spaces, indifference, or frightened silence.

We confess the church's complacency that allowed for perverted versions of the gospel to spread.

We confess the Truth of the Gospel of Jesus Christ as a living narrative of hope, liberation, abundance, compassion and loving invitation to all people to seek reconciliation with one another.

We honor God's promise of abundance for all.

We offer an invitation to a faith that proclaims a Christ who joins in suffering rather than a Christ who seeks power and domination.

We offer an invitation to faith that proclaims God's Kingdom is already present, and we are invited to participate in it in all we do and say.

We believe faith spaces must be courageous spaces.

We honor different interpretations of scripture.

We are people of the resurrection, standing with the disciples who were shocked, frightened and devastated.

We proclaim the resurrection as a joyful surprise in times of uncertainty.

We affirm that the Church is salt and light.

We proclaim a gospel that encompasses all people and all of creation.

We affirm that all creation belongs to God.

We affirm our call to be good stewards of our resources for the betterment of the global community.

In response to fear, we proclaim hope.

In response to manipulation, we proclaim liberation.

In response to scarcity, we proclaim abundance.

In response to hate, we proclaim compassion.

We commit to walk humbly towards this vision.

We commit to teaching critical thinking in our communities.

We commit to be counter cultural.

We commit to find the courage to act out of love instead of fear.

We commit to recognize the belovedness of all people.

We commit to resist and protest dehumanization.

We commit to interfaith dialogue.

We commit to create educational resources.

We commit to breaking down walls between God's people.

We commit to remembering the Source of our faith.

We commit to being good stewards of scripture.

We promise to offer abundant opportunities to experience joy together, learn together, and pray together.

Amen.

The Germans have taken this document home with them, and we plan to continue our work together through Zoom calls until we meet again in Germany in April. If anyone would like to know more about this program, please let me know!

Undies Sunday Report

The socks and undies are all counted and divided. They will be delivered to the elementary school social worker. She goes to all five elementary schools and knows where there is the most current need. Altogether we donated 29 pair of boy's socks and 24 pair of girl's socks, 51 pair of boy's briefs and 81 pair of girl's undies. That's 185 items.

I know from past experience how much these are appreciated. Can you imagine a child sitting in wet clothes in your classroom. They would be too uncomfortable and distracted to learn. So, A BIG THANK YOU! All will be used to keep our children warm and dry!

S.O.S. Support Our Students UPDATE

Our church joined a group of 13 other churches to provide school supplies to 450 students who attend school or are home schooled in Watertown.

All supplies were gathered and sorted on Monday August 19th into individual, grade level bags for each child who had been registered by a parent. Families drove up to St. Henry's to receive their bags the next day. Many who registered late were able to receive supplies on Wednesday. Items not given out on the 20th and 21st were either given to the schools or stored for next year.

Fifty-six volunteers helped on Monday, 47 on Tuesday and 20 on Thursday. All volunteers were busy. We were also grateful for donated money. In late July and early August many shoppers drove all over to get the lowest price on multiple items. A conservative estimate of all supplies was \$15,949.

The SOS mission program was started by our church. Children were given their supplies in our Youth Room. In 2011 the program was expanded to include other area churches. The program is now run by the Shared Community Mission Group (SCMG), a group of 12 area churches.
