

"From the Master Gardener"

Remembering Jan Sanders (1938-2018) Jan's gardening column from June 2013



June 2013: "Petunias"

- "How can you not love a petunia? They are usually the first thing to catch your eye at the garden center. 20 years ago, I didn't like petunias at all, now thanks to all the new hybrids, I love them. The old types of petunia looked great in May and early June and then by July were stringy things with a few blooms on the end of the stems. They had to be deadheaded everyday and this was a slimy job after rain.
- Now we have many hybrids: two of them, Grandifloras and Multifloras are upright petunias that look best in an upright container. Unfortunately they still have many of the annoying habits of the older varieties, although they have more and larger blooms and have been hybridized to have amazing color and all kinds of variegations. They still need daily deadheading and look terrible after a rain. You can help prevent the stringy look by pinching them back when you plant. This means you will lose all the blooms that are on the plant when you buy it, but this makes the plant bush out and about 3 weeks later you will have blooms again. In July you will have a much better looking plant than any of the neighbors. These are usually the petunias you see in a 4 or 6 pack and are less expensive. They do provide great color in spring and early summer and when they get straggly; you can always cut them back and you should get more blooms as the weather

gets cooler. They come in singles, doubles, stripes, and every color except true blue.

- There are also types of petunias available that avoid lots of the problems that the above have. These petunias are mostly all trailing petunias which means they are great in hanging baskets or for covering a large area.
- The first is the Wave petunia. This plant is grown from seed and was an AAS winner when first developed. It is available in many colors but not blue or yellow- there is one called blue, but it is really purple. Wave petunias do not need deadheading (that alone makes me buy them) and they are not affected much by rain. This is the petunia that covered the whole front end of our garden last summer. There is one upright variety called Tidal Wave, the other varieties are all trailing. Wave petunias need full sun, they should never be allowed to dry out, and do best if fertilized every other week. Because we added so much organic matter to our church bed, we have never fertilized anything, but for most gardens and definitely container plantings, you need to fertilize. These petunias are usually more expensive, they are often in 4 inch pots at a garden center. Wave petunias can be grown from seed so you will also see them at Fair Day and such.
- Next is Supertunias. This plant has the same advantages as Wave- no deadheading and more stamina. There is a yellow variety of Supertunia called Citrus. The Supertunia are only grown from cuttings. Supertunia blooms are usually slightly smaller and the plant trails to a longer length than a Wave. They are heavier feeders and should be fertilized every week. Again, they are usually in 4 inch pots and more expensive. They too require full sun for best performance and should never dry out. A new Supertunia this year that was named one of the top 10 new annuals by the U of Minnesota horticulture trials is "Raspberry Blast".

- Another great petunia is Picotee. This petunia is a type of Surfinia and also can only be grown from cuttings. Its seeds are not sterile but when grown from seed, the plants were never vigorous or as floriferous so the developers chose not to market the seeds. It has all the advantages of Wave and Supertunia plus more. The Picotee comes in red, pink, and purple and they all have a beautiful white border around the edge of the bloom or white striping. The nicest thing is that Picotee reblooms all along the stem so you never get the long stringy stem with blooms only on the end that you do with other petunias. It blooms vigorously all summer, even in the hottest months and can reach 5 foot or more in length. It too needs full sun and fertilizer every week. It is disease, pest and powdery mildew resistant. I had this plant for the first time last year and I absolutely loved it. I had the purple one with white edges and grew it in a pot. It bloomed continuously from late May until into November; although the last month or so I had it in the house. You will definitely see this plant in our church garden this year, probably in the big pot.
- A new Supertunia, also a top 10 winner at the U of MN is named "Patio Blue". It's a blue/purple color.
- If you buy a hanging pot of petunias, you really need to fertilize every week. These pots look so beautiful because there are a lot of plants in them and they gobble up nutrients and water like crazy. So feed them and keep them moist if you want them to continue looking great.
- Be sure to check the petunia plant labels if you are looking for a specific type of petunia.
- Many petunias have a fragrance although not everyone likes it. Petunias can hardly be beat for adding lots of great colors, many blooms and interesting variegations to your garden.

- 5. The flower bed off the parking lot as you enter the memorial garden (with the crane sculptures)
- ***NOTE: for the sake of the bees and butterflies, the use of Roundup is prohibited.
