### From the Pastor's Desk

Summer vacation—if you happened to have one—has flown by us. The Olympians have all finished their events and returned home. The political party conventions have wrapped up their business. School begins this

month. It's official: fall has arrived and a new program year has begun to unfold.

This fall will certainly bring its own busyness—not just getting back into the gear of regular life, not just the routine seasonal activities, not just preparing for cooler weather—but an important decision for our republic. There will be no way this fall to ignore the reality that we find ourselves in the final stretch of an election season.

A lot of religious terminology and claims of Christian identity have been invoked by politicians and political movements in our contemporary era. Although some may think that religion has nothing to do with politics, I don't know anyone who truly believes that, and I think our current campaign cycles have made such a claim impossible.

But the truth is such a claim on the division of faith and public life has never been accurate. Christian teaching has always had bearing on social ethics, which includes how we engage political structures. In other words, our Christian discipleship has always had something to say—and should still inform—our political values. Unfortunately, what complicates these dynamics even more is that those who promote the idea of faith-formed politics most loudly in our society

seem to be the *least* informed about biblical content and Christian values.

As a congregation from a Christian tradition that values both intellectually infused faith exploration and justice-based social engagement, we are called to take part in—and serve as an example of—a discipleship of higher political discourse. To help equip us for such discipleship, I will be offering a six-week class on "Adult Christian Civics" on Tuesday evenings, starting this month. (Please see accompanying article.)

May we start this autumn season reflecting how we can re-commit our discipleship to loving God with all our hearts *and minds* and *loving our neighbors* as ourselves.

NEW CLASS ON TUESDAY EVENINGS:

"Adult Christian Civics"

Unless you've been living under a rock, you know we find ourselves in the middle of a major election season. The national party conventions have met, debate schedules are being negotiated, and we will select a new president and vice-president in November. We will also cast our vote for one of Wisconsin's U.S. Senate seats as well as our member of Congress. In addition, we'll be deciding state legislative seats and other local offices. Make no mistake, there will be much on our November ballots.

You are also likely aware of this congregation's commitment to put our faith into action, that our understanding of discipleship informs our interactions with the public square. And scripture shows us time and again how although we are not to be partisan, Jesus and the early church are certainly called to engagement with political forces.

This season creates an opportunity to think together about how our faith lives and our political choices intersect. Beginning September 10, we will gather for six weeks on Tuesday evenings at 6 for our next adult education programming. We will be drawing on the Wisconsin Council of Churches' study guide called "Jesus and Justice in Public."


But we won't be doing classroom learning alone.
Watertown's Common Council also meets on two
Tuesday evenings a month. So, for three of our
sessions (September 17, October 1, and October
15), we will end class by traveling to city hall and
attending meetings of our local government,
perhaps applying what we're learning and making
observations for our next session together.

Although our class will end on October 15, our "final exam" will be held on Tuesday, November 5 as we seek to put our discipleship commitments into place when we make political choices for the common good.

# Renewal Project of the Gaston Memorial Flower Garden.

We will be starting the process to rejuvenate our raised flower bed by the entrance to the Narthex (the Gaston Memorial Flower Garden). The cement blocks that hold the beds have succumbed to our Wisconsin weather with its freezing and thawing and the use of salt. We have a contractor scheduled to arrive in late September to rebuild a new foundation and walls with a stairwell to more easily access the flower beds.

To prepare for this, the current plants will be cut back in the very near future to remove as many weeds as possible. We will use a heavy weed barrier to try to control the weeds after the new wall is in place and are planning to place more perennials in the bed with a bark mulch to minimize maintenance requirements.



One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM).
