From the Pastor's Desk

Theologians and biblical scholars have long noted a big problem with how we celebrate Christmas. I don't mean the consumerism, commercialism, or overconsumption that happens in December. Much more

specifically, there is a problem with how scripture is used and read and heard when it comes to the Christmas story, and that problem is called *supersessionism*.

Supersessionism is the theological idea that Christianity has superseded or replaced Judaism as God's true covenantal religion. In this scheme, the Hebrew Scriptures—what we call the Old Testament—exist only to point to the New Testament; the prophets serve only to "predict" the coming of Jesus. This idea is very common, present in all kinds of Christmas programs and music. Unfortunately, it is also very wrong.

Our Old Testament, as part of a larger group of Jewish scriptures, stands as a foundational testament to God for the Jewish religion. It contains its own stories, its own themes, its own ideas—that, by themselves, have nothing to do with Jesus. Despite a wide misunderstanding, the prophets do not predict anything about Jesus' life. Rather, they delivered God's message to the people in their own time and place. When they did talk about the future, they often referred to both God's judgment as a consequence for present actions and God's promise for a future without suffering.

Occasionally, we may find a reference to a coming messiah, which simply means "anointed one" or "chosen one". It's important to understand that it means different things not only to Jewish people today, but even within the Hebrew Scriptures themselves. It can be understood as when God—in all God's fullness—comes to earth. Some Jews still expect a Messiah. In some passages, messiah refers to Cyrus, the ruler of Persia who allowed the Hebrew people to return home after the Babylonian Exile. In the Hebrew Scriptures, "messiah" never was meant to refer to Jesus.

When the New Testament writers experienced or heard about Jesus, they used the language of their scriptures—the Hebrew Scriptures, our Old Testament—to describe his importance. They did see him as God's Messiah, but the difference is that's not the perspective of the Hebrew Scriptures, nor, of course, of Jewish people today.

The purpose in pointing all this out is that we need to recognize that we *share* our Old Testament with another religious tradition, a tradition to whom those scriptures belonged originally. Because of this shared heritage, we should be thoughtful when interpreting the Hebrew Scriptures, respectful of the whole non-Christian tradition of understanding them, and acknowledge the historical fact that due to their composition centuries before Jesus, only an after-the-fact interpretation sees them as being about Jesus. Most scholars go so far as to point out that to interpret our Old Testament in a supersessionist manner is to accept an inherently anti-Semitic (anti-Jewish) position. And that is not faithful.

In worship this Advent, the sermons will focus on hearing the Hebrew Scripture texts in their own voice—that is, hearing what they have to say on their own without our automatic assumption that they're about Jesus. Often, the simple inclusion of one more verse reveals enough context to a passage to show its meaning as completely different than what we might expect.

I give thanks for our choir members who continue to serve faithfully leading the singing of our hymns. You never know when there might be an opportunity to play.

Church musicians, vocal or instrumental, are providing ministry in another way. We not only serve as leaders of the hymns but also add an anthem or special music to the service which is intended to expand upon the theme of the lectionary or the service, or provide music as a backdrop for prayerful meditation.

Today we are severely challenged and ask for your help to provide for emergency needs in our community. (Housing, food insecurity, transportation to work and utilities)

- Housing: Includes rent/security deposits. The uptick in lack of housing opportunities and the loss of employment. 2 week delays/wait for their first paycheck. Domestic Abuse victims seeking help. Winter and summer temperatures are life threatening for those whose only shelter is their car.
- Emergency Utility Assistance: we help families who have had gas & electric shut off during times of extreme heat/extreme cold. They work with We Energies on budget billing but still fall behind.
- Extreme food insecurity: Gift cards for Groceries
- Transportation to work: "Fuel Only" gas cards

(**We are not alone**. We work with our contacts through case workers in Jefferson and Dodge County, CAC Community Action Coalition and the caseworker at the Police Department.

In addition, we also coordinate assistance with St. Paul's Episcopal church, the Moravian churches and Immanuel ELCA's Hometown Missions.)
